PEARL HARBOR


On December 7, 1941, Japan attacked the U.S. Pacific fleet at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Six Japanese aircraft carriers, 25 submarines, and more than 30 other ships were north of Hawaii. The carriers launched more than 180 Japanese warplanes in the first wave, or part, of the attack. In the next wave, 70 planes attacked. U.S. ships and airfields were hit. An armor-piercing bomb struck the battleship Arizona




and exploded the ammunition section. The ship was blown apart. In minutes, the huge ship sank, and 1,177 crew members died.

Overall, 21 ships were sunk or beached and over 180 aircraft were destroyed. Luckily, the U.S. aircraft carriers were not in port at the time, so they were safe. Japanese bombers did not seriously damage the base or hit the large fuel tanks. Americans fought back and were able to take down 29 Japanese planes. About 2,400 Americans were killed. About 100 Japanese were killed.

The next day, December 8, the U.S. declared war on Japan. Britain and Canada declared war on Japan the same day. Germany and Italy declared war on the U.S. on December 11. By the end of 1941, the war was worldwide.



WATERGATE 1972

Watergate is the name of the biggest political scandal in U.S. history.

In June 1972, a security guard at the Watergate Hotel saw that a door was not locked. There was some tape over the latch. He pulled the tape off. Later, he saw that someone had re-taped the door. He called the police. Five men were arrested. They were caught with wiretapping equipment.



Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein were two reporters from the *Washington Post*. They kept digging into the facts. Then, a secret friend called "Deep Throat" gave them information. The reporters soon found links to the White House. The burglars were on the White House payroll!

Americans were shocked to learn that the burglars were on President Nixon's re-election team. The burglars had bugged the Democratic headquarters to steal information. The information was used to help get Nixon re-elected. People were given large amounts of money to cover up or hide the facts about the break-in.

Nixon's office told America that none of Nixon's staff was part of the break-in. The following November, Americans re-elected Nixon for a second term as U.S. President.

On Tuesday, September 11, 2001, the world changed forever. Nineteen terrorists took control of four American planes. Two of the hijacked planes were flown at top speed to New York City. The planes, along with the passengers, slammed into the twin towers of the World Trade Center. The buildings burst into flames. Less than two hours later, the skyscrapers collapsed into a huge pile of smoldering rubble. New York firefighters and rescue workers rushed to save lives. Many of these heroes died while helping others.

A third hijacked plane crashed into the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia. The plane slammed into the side of the U.S. military headquarters and exploded.





The fourth plane was headed for either the White House or the U.S. Capitol. Several people on board the plane had made phone calls, and they knew about the other attacks. The passengers and crew fought the terrorists. The plane went down in Pennsylvania. Everyone on board died. However, many lives were saved because of their brave actions.

Americans united to help. Firefighters and medical workers rushed to the disaster areas. All non-emergency aircraft were grounded. The military went on high alert. The National Guard called in troops to patrol major cities. Donations of food, money, supplies, and blood were sent to help the victims and their families. Funds were set up too. Aid poured in from all over the world.

More than 3,000 people died as a result of the 9/11 attacks.
